

Welcome to our 2025 Festival - our 57th year

Our 2024 festival was our 56th annual festival event and we were thrilled to have a wonderful number of performers taking part and feedback from adjudicators, parents, teachers and performers was very positive as always.

Following our soloists' weekend seven of our talented music festival performers were invited back to take part in our virtual Milton Keynes Young Musician of the Year showcase and we were delighted to welcome Nadia Hinson and concert pianist / teacher Craig Greene to provide constructive feedback. The winner was chosen as pianist Waika Hagan Chu who played a most impressive performance of the Chopin Nocturne Op 15 No 1 and Piazzolla – Suite para Piano Op 2 with Reeka Chanelle Manglicmot - piano and violin in second place and violinist Sean Lau in third place.

The other highly accomplished finalists were Matias Yung - piano and cello, Mason Huo - piano, Evie Cooper - violin and Yiding Wang - piano. Fabulous guest performances by Milton Keynes Young Singer of the Year 2024 Hope Dionisio-Sagau and adult festival entrant, pianist Vicky Letsman added an extra level of entertainment to the event, which was hosted by Festival Vice-President Mr Adrian Boynton. All recitalists took away a certificate, special trophy and a small amount of prize money as a memento of their special showcase.

We are so privileged to have the continued sponsorship by Kawai Pianos who donate several of their beautiful concert grand and upright pianos to our music festival for our performers' use and we are grateful to Neil and Tom for their generous support and for also agreeing to extend their patronage to the Milton Keynes Young Musician of the Year competition. Important: If you put an email address on your entry form, you will not receive any entry tickets

or details by post, only by email, which is quicker and easier, so do check your email

inbox and junk folder regularly. You can enter the festival in any of these ways:

Online: Go to our website, www.miltonkeynesfestival.org and register online, enter all

performers' names and their classes using our online system and then pay the stated amount by PayPal, which confirms your entry. Using this method, you can amend your entries, check your entries and receive all your performance times by email. If

you entered online last year you will only need to enter your new pupils.

By Post: You can complete the entry form enclosed and post it to the address on the form

along with a cheque or you can pay by BACS. Please provide an email address, as you will receive all your performance times by email. Please keep a copy of completed

form(s) for your own records if entering by post.

Email: You can send your form by email, but if you do so, you must pay your entry free

immediately by BACS as entries will not be inputted to the system until we have

confirmation of payment.

Rosalind trained at The Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama and at The Laban Centre of Movement and Dance, London.

Rosalind has taught speech and drama for over thirty years and has led several large Performing Arts departments. She continues to deliver workshops at leading vocational schools and universities, both in the United Kingdom and internationally. In addition to her teaching credits,

Rosalind has extensive experience in directing and creating original devised material for vocational and community outreach projects.

Rosalind has spent over twenty years working alongside award-winning choreographers with the National Youth Ballet of Great Britain – on their Creative Team, as drama coach and repetiteur.

She continues to support their Beyond Ballet initiative for new and aspiring young choreographers, Rosalind is an adjudicator for the British and International Federation of Festivals, and a Senior Examiner and Team Leader for The London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art. Through her work Rosalind has travelled extensively leading directorial, voice and LAMDA workshops in China, Hong Kong, Singapore, Bahrain, Australia, Sri Lanka, East Africa, California and throughout Europe.

On graduating from Bristol University with a degree in Drama and English, Rebecca worked for BBC Radio Four's Drama Department. After further journalism and corporate work, Rebecca studied for her Licentiate Teacher's Diploma and has been teaching Speech and Drama privately and in schools for over 25 years.

Additionally, a voice and presentation skills coach in the region, she teaches in private and state schools, colleges and businesses and is a

facilitator for Speaking and Listening Courses in the South Gloucestershire region; in addition, she facilitates communication training in schools across the country.

Rebecca has been actively involved in theatre in the Southwest and is an Adjudicator for the Rose Bowl Awards for Amateur Drama and Music; she also continues to direct plays with young people.

Rebecca is passionate about developing communication skills amongst people of all ages and abilities; she sees the festival movement as an excellent way of achieving this goal. Rebecca has adapted her teaching methods during recent months and is very happy to adjudicate in person or online.

- A piece must not be repeated across the classes (including your recital).
- Only one grade per instrument may be entered in all graded classes, and entrants / parents / teachers are responsible for ensuring the correct grade has been selected.
- If you play a piece recognised by the adjudicator to be above the stated level you may not be placed.
- Standards are indicated either by age, grade, or by experience in tuition. Where a class is
 divided into grades, the entrant should be able to play to that standard, but not yet have
 passed a higher grade than that specified. The piece played must reflect the standard
 entered, ie a piece set for a grade 5 exam should not be played in an Elementary class, it
 should be played in an Intermediate class.

Non-competitive classes

These are for those solo performers who do not wish to compete, but would enjoy performing to an audience, receiving feedback from the adjudicator and a certificate. The only difference is that the performers will not compete with one another and will not be eligible for a cup/prize.

Accompanists

See **www.miltonkeynesfestival.org** for a list of pianists or you may use your own. The festival does not have official accompanists, so if you need an accompanist, please make sure you make necessary arrangements for a rehearsal and your performance <u>as soon as you have confirmed</u> your entry.

You must expect to pay a fee to your pianist / accompanist for your festival performance and any rehearsals you arrange. Please deal direct with your pianist / accompanist and agree all fees and any rehearsal dates with him / her. If you are unable to attend your festival class, do make sure you inform your accompanist, or you may still be charged with the agreed fee.

Backing Track Accompaniment for Instrumental Classes

To assist parents and teachers with the cost of entering the festival, instrumental (not voice or piano) performers in classes for grades Beginners, Preparatory and Elementary (grades up to and including grade 4) may choose to use a backing track accompaniment if they wish instead of a live accompaniment.

The track should be provided on either a CD or via a device which can be connected by Bluetooth to our playback machine. We have instigated this new option following feedback from parents and teachers. You can still have live piano accompaniment or no accompaniment at all if you prefer.

Your 2025 Music Festival Adjudicators



Piano Adjudicator Joseph Tong MA(Cantab), DipRAM, LRAM, ARAM

Joseph Tong enjoys a busy and varied career as soloist, duo pianist, chamber musician, writer, teacher and adjudicator. Joseph made his Wigmore Hall debut in 1997 as winner of the Maisie Lewis Young Artists Award and gives regular recitals throughout the UK and abroad. He has been a visiting teacher at Wells Cathedral School since 2008 and holds teaching posts at Hampton School and Trinity School, Croydon.

Joseph Tong studied at Wells Cathedral School and Christ's College, Cambridge before completing postgraduate studies at the RAM with

Christopher Elton.

He has given recitals in Japan, USA, Singapore, Italy, Germany and Spain both as a soloist and in a piano duo with Waka Hasegawa. Over recent years, concerts in Finland have included invitations to perform at Sibelius's home Ainola, the Sibelius Museum in Turku and Helsinki Music Centre. Other solo recitals have included St John's, Smith Square in London, St George's Bristol, St David's Hall, Cardiff and the Presteigne Festival.

In 2018, Joseph recorded a CD of Schumann at the Sendesaal in Bremen, for release this summer on the Quartz label.

His ongoing Sibelius recording project has received widespread critical acclaim and a further disc with violinist Fenella Humphreys was released in January 2022, being selected as 'Chamber Choice' in BBC Music Magazine. A keen chamber musician, Joseph is a regular visitor to the Wye Valley Chamber Music Festival, frequently performing with his brother Daniel and in various ensembles. He has also commissioned and premiered piano duets by composers including Dai Fujikura, Daniel Kidane, Nicola LeFanu, David Matthews and Edwin Roxburgh.

Joseph Tong was elected an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music (ARAM) in 2008. He is Coordinator of the Wells International Piano Summer School and has been a member of the teaching faculty of the Chetham's International Summer School and Festival for Pianists.



Piano Adjudicator Anthony Williams MMus GRSM (Hons), Dip Ram, LRAM

Concert pianist, writer, lecturer, examiner and adjudicator, Anthony Williams studied at the Royal Academy of Music, London and then at Reading University.

Following international competition success, he embarked on a career as a concert pianist and alongside this quickly established an international reputation as a piano teacher and a passionate educator of pianistic musicianship at all ages and levels, giving piano masterclasses, public

lecture-recitals and seminars on performance and the art of teaching both in the UK and abroad, including China and Hong Kong. He also coaches on International Summer Schools and Residential Courses.

Anthony has given talks on piano performance for Radio 3 and is author and editor of various publications including The Best of Grade and Fingerprints (Faber), Teaching Notes (ABRSM), EPTA Piano Journal, and the highly acclaimed Piano Teacher's Survival Guide (Faber).

He is an ABRSM examiner (diploma, jazz and classical), educational consultant, and a member of the examiner training and review team. He is also a member of BIFF, Chair of EPTA Europe and President of Chipping Norton Music Festival. He was Head of Keyboard and Instrumental at Radley College, Oxfordshire for 34 years until retiring last summer to focus on his freelance and consultancy work.



Piano Adjudicator Gill Johnston AGSM

Gillian studied the bassoon with Archie Camden at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and, after a period of freelance playing, concentrated on a teaching career, before moving to Harpenden where she established her own Music School, 'Harpenden Musicale'.

As well as running the Music School, Gill arranges Musicale Holidays, Competitions and a Summer Music Festival. She is the founder and Musical

Director of the National Children's Wind Orchestra and associated groups. Gill is an adjudicator for The British and International Federation of Festivals and very much enjoys contact with young musicians, inspiring and enthusing their interest in music.



Vocal Adjudicator Jane Wilkinson BMus (Hons) (RSAMD), GradDipRCM

Jane trained as a soprano at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama and then at the Royal College of Music where she won many competitions and awards. She performs solo art song recitals across the country and has toured South Africa, Europe and America. Jane teaches singing at Laine Theatre Arts and is a singing tutor at Imperial College, London. She is a former singing teacher at St Cecilia's School, Wandsworth, Brunel Universities, Chelsea Academy and Flora Gardens

School, Hammersmith. Jane is a former member of the National Youth Choirs of Great Britain and now conducts New Malden Voices and New Malden Youth Choir. Jane has premiered many contemporary operas and frequently works alongside composers on new works for the stage and for recordings. She has performed oratorios and concerts at Edinburgh Festival, Royal Albert Hall and many other distinguished venues.

Jane leads vocal masterclasses and workshops internationally and often runs 'audition technique' days for aspiring singers. Jane has taught singers of all ages and standards and has a great passion for educating. Her voice has featured on a wide variety of albums and recordings from children's repertoire to contemporary folk rock. Jane has been adjudicating for the British and International Federation of Festivals since 2012.



Vocal Adjudicator Belinda Mikhail BMus (Hons), PgDipRCM, ARCM,EMT

Belinda Mikhaïl was awarded the Associated Board and the Queen Mother Scholarships to study piano and singing as a joint first study at the Royal College of Music where she won the Hopkinson Gold Medal for her final recital. She has travelled extensively performing both as a soloist and as a chamber musician and has appeared as a concerto soloist at the major London Concert Halls.

She has made numerous recordings for Sony BMG and Universal and is a vocal soloist on EMI's Vocalise album as used in trailers for ER, Lost and Grey's Anatomy. She appears as the featured soloist on many film soundtracks and her solo piano playing of the theme from Chariots of Fire was heard at every medal ceremony at the London Olympic Games.

Belinda is also in demand as a vocal coach for classical, musical theatre, pop and rock singers and runs an extensive private teaching practice. She has trained performers as diverse as Siouxsie Sioux, Jennifer Ellison, Jack Garrett, Cathy Tyson, the Oscar-winning actress Juliette Binoche, as well as the world-renowned dancer Akram Khan. Her students are enjoying major roles in theatre companies up and down the country as well as West End Shows such as Anything Goes, Chicago, Dreamgirls, Haddestown, Dirty Dancing, Book of Mormon and High School Musical, and the hit TV series', Bridgerton, Downton Abbey and Broadchurch.

Belinda's work as an adjudicator has seen her travel extensively; she was invited to Trinidad and Tobago where she adjudicated their month-long biennial Music Festival and future trips will see her travel to both Sri Lanka and Hong Kong. She thoroughly enjoys listening to a wide variety of music and meeting a wealth of musicians as she travels in her role as an adjudicator.



Instrumental Adjudicator Jonathan Rea MA (Cantab), LTCL, PGCE

Jonathan studied music at Cambridge, where he sang in the University Chamber Choir and studied piano with Peter Pettinger. He held choral and instrumental awards and won the Rima Alamuddin prize for piano performance.

After 10 happy years as Director of Music in Bangor Grammar School, he began a broader career in conducting, producing, writing, composing, arranging and piano accompaniment. He has conducted many

programmes for BBC Songs of Praise and directed the Belfast choir for Children in Need. For several years he was the Principal Examiner for A-Level Music Performance in Northern Ireland. He is the choral director for the annual Sing! conference in Nashville, for whom he has on two occasions directed choirs with 1000 participants. He now provides consultancy to a number of church-based organisations.

Jonathan is Creative Director and Chief Executive of New Irish Arts, whose choir, orchestra and youth choir perform at over 20 events per year. They have sold out Belfast's Waterfront Hall on numerous occasions, and often have over 250 participants in their larger concerts. Jonathan is increasingly in demand as a writer and speaker, occasionally contributing to programmes like Radio 4's Prayer for the Day and Morning Service.

In the Queen's Birthday Honours List in 2020, Jonathan was awarded the British Empire Medal for services to Music in Northern Ireland. He enjoys being a Federation adjudicator because he finds it immensely satisfying to play a part in helping people pursue their musical potential.



- Standards are indicated either by age, grade, or by experience in tuition. Where a class is
 divided into grades, the entrant should be able to play to that standard, but not yet have
 passed a higher grade than that specified.
- The piece played must reflect the standard entered, ie a piece set for a grade 5 exam should not be played in an Elementary (grade 4) class. Only one grade may be entered in all graded classes, and entrants and/or teachers are responsible for ensuring the correct grade has been selected.

Multiple Entries

- (Music Classes only) Entrants may perform once only in each class, except in duet, trio
 or ensemble classes where an entrant may perform more than once provided a different
 part is performed. Entrants who are members of more than one choir or ensemble are
 permitted to perform as a member of each choir or ensemble to which they belong.
- **(Speech Classes only):** A performer may only enter a class once. When performing in a duologue or group class a second entry is permitted provided a different part with a different partner/group is performed.

Own Choice Pieces

- The festival is under a legal obligation to supply the Performing Rights Society with details of all items to be performed.
- Own choice titles and composers must be given on the entry form for all sections.
- A copy of each Own Choice piece must be handed to the adjudicator's steward at the time of the performance.
- Photocopies are acceptable provided an original is used for the performance. The photocopy will be retained and destroyed after the adjudication of the class.

Speech & Drama Section

- Entrants do not have to seek copyright permission for any poetry, prose or solo dramatic items performed, to a time limit of 10 minutes.
- Duologues and group dramatic activity are not covered by this agreement, and copyright for these items should be sought by performers at the time of entry.
- Solo dramatic items must be announced with title and author at the time of performance to qualify for copyright indemnity, and the performer must not change the words or gender of the character.

Time Limits

- The time limit for each class is shown in the syllabus and this must be strictly adhered to.
- Any performance in which there is an excessive overrun of the time limit will be stopped by the adjudicator or adjudicator's clerk.
- Where the performance is obviously ending as the time limit is reached, the adjudicator's steward will allow the performance to conclude, but will inform the adjudicator when the time limit is reached, and his/her category and remarks will not cover material performed after the time limit is exceeded.
- Although time limits are specified you are required to time your piece/s and enter this under "Performance Time" as accurately as possible on the Entry Form.

Photocopying of Music

The festival cannot legally allow anyone to play/perform from photocopied music and has no choice but to disqualify performers who do so, unless before their class starts, they can produce evidence showing that the publisher's agreement has been sought and given.

The only photocopies the festival can allow in law are:

- Copies for the adjudicator's use, which will be destroyed at the end of each class.
- For an awkward page-turn which may hinder a performance.

Accompanists

• Entrants are advised that the festival does not engage official accompanists. There are suggestions on the festival website or you may bring your own.

Notification of time, date and venue of performers' classes

Performers will be notified as to the time, date and venue of their class/es as soon as possible after closing date for entries, and not later than 21 days before the commencement of their section. This information will be emailed to you if an email address has been provided.

Certificates

- All entrants will be issued with a certificate and an adjudication, providing the Festival rules have been complied with.
- The categories awarded will be in accordance with the standards laid down by the British and International Federation of Festivals as follows:

95+	Exceptional
90 - 94	Outstanding
85 - 89	Distinction
80 - 84	Commended
75 - 79	Merit
70 - 74	Progressing
65 - 69	Developing

• The winners of each class will be announced. Further placings will be awarded at the discretion of the adjudicator. (Please see sections for specific arrangements.)

Adjudicators

- Only festival officials directly concerned with the section may approach the adjudicator while the session is in progress.
- The adjudicator may stop any performance when his or her judgement has been formed. The adjudicator's decision in all cases is final.

Photography and Recording

- No photography, videotaping or audio recording is permitted of any live performance at any festival event by anyone, other than official photographers authorised by the organisers, in any circumstances. Please respect this rule and do not attempt to photograph any performer.
- Photographs of trophy/medal presentations will only be permitted with the express consent of the adjudicator, organiser and parents of the children concerned.

- In order to assist in promotion of the festival, the press, television and radio may be invited to attend, and the festival may engage an official photographer. All photographs, video or film recording will be limited to the performance area, in the presence of festival officials.
- Parents or teachers entering children individually or in groups will be asked to indicate on entries those children who are not to be photographed, video-taped or filmed.

Child Protection

• The Festival's Child Protection Policy and approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone is published explicitly in our Syllabus, Programme and Website. By completing and signing the entry form (or online entry system) all parents / guardians / carers and teachers of entrants under 18 (or vulnerable adults of any age) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the entrants to take part in the festival. Without consent the entry to the festival cannot be accepted.

Any decision of the Committee in all matters arising out of, or not specifically covered in these rules, is final.

Child Protection Policy

Milton Keynes Festival of the Arts for Music, Dance and Drama

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech works for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.

The Federation, and our member Festivals, are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind.

We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount.
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies are essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

• to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members. to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm.

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year in November in line with any changes in legislation or guidance.

Child Licensing Regulations regarding Child Performances (children aged 16 or under)

The children involved in the festival will be authorised by a Body of Persons Approval organised by the festival with Milton Keynes Council.

Body of Persons Approval (BOPA)

A BOPA removes the need to apply for individual licences for child performers and it is granted to the organisation that is responsible for the performances, ie Milton Keynes Festival. It is therefore the organisation that is approved as a suitable group. It can apply to one performance, or a series of performances so it covers our whole festival. The dance section of the festival will organise its own BOPA.

The festival performances must meet at least one of the following to require a BOPA:

- A charge was made in connection with the performance (e.g an admission fee)
- It took place on licensed premises for alcohol supply
- It was broadcast performance
- It was recorded to be broadcast
- Performances organised and produced by your child's school are exempt.
- In order to satisfy the local authority that our festival is a suitable organisation to be granted a BOPA, the local authority needs to see evidence of the following:
- Clear and robust safeguarding policies
- Designated Safeguarding Officer
- A regularly updated Child Protection Policy in place
- Evidence of any safeguarding training undertaken by festival team
- DBS checking of volunteers
- The supervision of children from sign-in to sign-out, including provision for supervision backstage if applicable.
